Public Participation

Water users Rocky and Rogelio Sandoval attended the Board meeting to request a progress update on the issue they brought to the Board recently regarding a private ditch that was backfilled by a neighboring landowner, which is preventing water delivery to their pasture along lateral 56-1c. Mr. Sandoval reiterated that he has offered to maintain the private ditch for the neighboring landowner and has switched to an electric pump to address noise concerns brought up by their neighbor when irrigating in 24-hour blocks, six times per year for the previous 20+ years. Director Bransford expressed concerns about a water user within the District not having access to water. General Manager Sutton reported that staff are meeting with the neighboring landowner on Tuesday, August 6, who backfilled the ditch, causing this issue. Staff will then contact the Sandovals regarding a potential path forward.

The newly appointed Tehama-Colusa Canal Authority General Manager, Bill Vanderwaal, joined the meeting to introduce himself. He explained that he is attending various TCCA Member District Board meetings. He offered to attend future meetings by request if the GCID Board ever wishes to discuss any GCID/TCCA operations. Mr. Sutton and Mr. Vanderwaal have worked together for nearly 14 years and look forward to the continued partnership as managers of both Districts.

President Amaro addressed the Board, reporting that former GCID Board member and current GCID water user, Don Cecil, tragically lost his daughter in a diving accident. He asked that everyone keep the Cecil family in their prayers as they navigate this very difficult time. General Manager Jeff Sutton reported that a flower arrangement was sent to the Cecil family on behalf of the District. He also reported that there were, unfortunately, two other incidences where District staff recently lost family members. Administrative Services Manager Karen Alves reported that GCID retiree Steve Yaeger's son was involved in a fatal motor vehicle accident and GCID retiree LeRoy Johnson also lost his son to a motor vehicle accident. Our prayers are with all of their loved ones during these difficult times.

Authorize Payment of Claims

Director Dennis moved to approve the payment of claims #24 14725 through #24 14756, in the amount of Four Hundred Fifty-Four Thousand, Four Hundred Fifty-Nine Dollars and Sixty-Four Cents (\$454,459.64), and approve the July 18, 2024, meeting minutes. BUSINESS ITEMS

Discuss and Consider Authorizing Staff to Execute Sales Order for Ford F-550 in Excess of Budgeted Amount

Maintenance Superintendent Richardson reported that the Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget included \$100,000 for the purchase of two F-550 or equivalent vehicles (\$50,000 each) to replace two existing District spray trucks. Staff recently received a quote for one Ford F-550 matching the specifications provided to the dealer. The estimated cost, including taxes and delivery, is approximately \$70,000, exceeding the budgeted amount by \$20,000. Per the Board's approval, staff would move forward with the purchase of one F-550 from the Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget and include the second F-550 in the Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget.

Director Bransford recommended Budget Committee meetings in the future to discuss these issues. He then moved to authorize staff to execute the sales for the Ford F-550 in excess of the budgeted amount. Director Vann seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by the following vote:

Discuss and Consider Adoption of Resolution No. 2024-05 - Approve District Lateral Categories and Related Actions Under District Operations and Maintenance Policy

Interim District Engineer Chris Privitera reported that during the July 18, 2024, Board meeting, staff presented the Operations and Maintenance Committee recommendations for consideration related to the Private Lateral easement acquisition process, including updates to the previously executed Resolution No. 2019-04. At that time, the Board directed staff to update the Resolution and bring it back for consideration.

The amended Resolution includes a zero-dollar charge to landowners, reimbursement of the original \$20 per-acre fee to landowners who previously completed the process (Laterals 32-1 and ESC-3), sets a date of December 31, 2025 to cease District will efforts to actively seek easement agreements for laterals in Category 5 (landowners may still petition the Board following that date if they so choose), and updates to the lateral category lists based on established definitions. These changes will result in an increase of approximately 3-4% or 10.4 miles of District lateral maintenance responsibility. The direct fiscal impact includes the costs of the \$20 per acre reimbursement to landowners who previously completed the process.

Interim District Engineer Privitera also reported the District is considering all potential risks that may result from seeking an easement agreement along East Side Canal 4 (ESC-4) where a housing subdivision is being developed along one side of the bank restricting maintenance access. Director Bransford expressed a concern regarding liability and suggested the construction of a fence between the bike path and the canal. The Board requested staff to work with the developers further and agendize the ESC-4 issue at a future meeting for further discussion and consideration.

Director Bransford moved to approve Resolution No. 2024-05. Director Vann seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by the following vote:

Discuss and Consider Setting Water Rates for Rice Decomposition and Habitat Use

Finance Director Jarvis reported that staff anticipates being able to deliver fall and winter water for rice decomposition and habitat through the start of the winter maintenance shutdown period. At this time, Term 91 curtailment is not anticipated to impact diversions during the period that the District diverts water under its winter water permit.

Historically, the rate charged for water for rice decomposition and habitat has been the same as the rate charged for water for irrigated crops. However, in both 2022 and 2023, the Board voted to reduce the charge from the rate charged for irrigated crops to \$5.00 per acre-foot for water used for rice decomposition and habitat. In past years, when approximately 100,000 acres of rice were grown within the District and winter diversions were not impacted by Term 91, the District delivered approximately 75,000 acre-feet of winter water. In 2023, after the closure of the fiber board plant, and with the reduction in price, the District delivered 113,000 acre feet of winter water.

The maximum rate that the District may charge for water ordered for rice decomposition and habitat purposes is equivalent to the rate charged for irrigated crops during 2024 (\$9.05 per acre-foot). Based on the acreage of rice planted this year, and assuming Term 91 does not impact District diversions after the contract period ends, staff anticipates that District water users would order 75,000 acre-feet or more of rice decomposition and habitat water during 2024. Director Knight commented that it is beneficial to show usage of the District's winter water. President Amaro noted that everyone is aware that commodity prices are down, acknowledged the importance of winter water for habitat uses, as well as the positive impact on groundwater levels, and indicated his support for setting the winter water rate at \$5.00 per acre-foot. Director Bransford stated that winter water is great for habitat and groundwater recharge, however he also noted that the District is not compensated for either of those efforts and is operating at a deficit.

Director Bransford moved to approve the water rate for rice decomposition and habitat use for \$5.00 per acre-foot for this year and directed that staff conduct a more detailed analysis of the cost of providing water for rice decomposition and habitat use for consideration in the rate setting next year. Director Vann seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved by the following vote:

ADMINISTRATION

Department Reports

Maintenance

Maintenance Superintendent Richardson reported that the Maintenance Department has applied a Cascade treatment on specific problem laterals due to the higher Main Canal flows further into the summer. They also applied Teton to problem areas where moss and scum were causing issues. The Maintenance Department has also repaired small holes and washouts as needed. Maintenance Superintendent Richardson also reported participating in various budget reviews and a meeting with landowners regarding Lynn Weir. Lastly, he reported that Maintenance staff worked with the County to unclog a pipe on County Road S and County Road 48.

Water

Water Operations Superintendent Henderson reported that the Pump Station is operating at 2,400 cubic feet per second (cfs) and 2,550 cfs at Stony Creek Siphon due to high river flows. Water Operations staff are encouraging the use of notched weired boards. Water Operators are moving back to the 4 day - 10 hour schedule. Staff have interviewed candidates to fill the two vacancies in the Water Department. He also reported that the California Highway Patrol were looking for two people missing out of Yuba City whose cellphones were last pinged in the Hamilton City area. They contacted the District asking for permission to look in the Main Canal and located the vehicle and two missing people. Lastly, he reported that the District water usage numbers are higher than experienced in many years, likely due to the extreme heat in the area for an extended period of time.

Director Bransford suggested the District send notification via call and text regarding the change in Water Operator schedules.

Engineering

Interim District Engineer Privitera reported that the Pump Station Electrical Control Room building is being erected and should be complete by August 2. The project will then pause for nearly one year as the contractors wait for electrical components to arrive to begin work on the interior of the building. He also reported that the District's Engineering and GIS interns are making great progress on all projects. Lastly, he reported that he continues to participate in the WaterSMART Grant development discussions.

INFORMATION REPORTS

Board Member Report

President Amaro reported that the Glenn Groundwater Authority held three public meetings and has set four different rates rather than the original one per-acre rate. Glenn County landowners have until August 5 to contact the County to appeal their classification for water use. There will be a Glenn Groundwater Authority Public Hearing on Monday, August 5.

Committee Reports

General Manager Sutton reported that staff will contact the Water Transfer Committee to schedule a meeting in the near future to discuss several water transfer proposals, considerations and to review District policy.

Manager's Report

General Manager Sutton reported that the Biden/Harris administration has invested \$400 million to address drought and conserve water through the USDA Drought Water-Saving Commodities Program. The District was identified as one of 18 potential participants in the western United States for a grant resulting in up to \$15 million in funding for water use efficiency and water conservation measures. Staff are working to evaluate and develop proposals for the best use of the USDA Grant funds.

General Manager Sutton reported on meetings with Bill Vanderwaal (TCCA) and Lewis Bair (RD 108), as well as a meeting with Sutter Mutual General Manager Roger Cornwell.

General Manager Sutton reported that he and President Amaro met with Glenn County Supervisor Grant Carmon to discuss opportunities to expand water supply, conveyance, water recharge opportunities, and conjunctive use, including further discussion regarding potential added infrastructure for Black Butte Reservoir.

General Manager Sutton reported on various Sites meetings including updates to the wheeling rate study. Sites staff would like to provide a presentation to the GCID Board and staff at the second Board meeting in September. He also provided an update on the appeal of the trial court decision upholding the Sites Project California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Environmental Impact Report.

General Manager Sutton reported that the Northern California Water Association (NCWA) has been leading a very productive dialogue related to the Floodplain Forward efforts, which will continue to be important in several venues as conversations continue about the connection between the floodplain and improving habitat for both fish and terrestrial species.

General Manager Sutton has been working with Holly Dawley at KSN regarding the various restoration project efforts. The District is working with Reclamation on the permitting and design of the projects, with certain project and funds having reprogrammed. Manager Sutton

anticipated 2-3 projects going to construction next winter. Completion of all contemplated projects may require a time extension.

Communications Report

None.

Attorney's Report

Counsel Hitchings reported that the petition for rehearing that the NRDC plaintiffs filed on the contract renewal litigation was denied by the court. Judgment will be entered now, and the plaintiffs have the option to file a petition certiorari before the US Supreme Court. This litigation has been pending for nearly two decades brought by several NGO plaintiffs alleging that the extent of the Endangered Species Act consultation that was conducted to review the effects of renewing the contracts was inadequate. Here, the court found that the agencies had performed an adequate ESA consultation. The other claim that was denied was a claim that after the 2014-15 drought and its impacts on Winter-Run salmon, the Bureau is required to reopen consultations on our contracts on the way that they were being performed to address effects on Winter-Run. The court found that the Bureau does not have the discretion under any provisions in the contract to reinitiate reconsultation based upon alleged effects due to performance of the contract.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024-05**

**A RESOLUTION APPROVING DISTRICT LATERAL CATEGORIES
AND RELATED ACTIONS UNDER
DISTRICT OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE POLICY**

WHEREAS, on January 23, 2014, Glenn-Colusa Irrigation District (District or GCID) adopted the Water Distribution System Operation and Maintenance Policy (O&M Policy), and on April 20, 2017, the District approved amendments to the O&M Policy;

WHEREAS, Section 3.4 of the O&M Policy sets forth the procedures for the District to assume Operation and Maintenance (O&M) responsibility for a Private Lateral that serves multiple users, as those terms are defined in the O&M Policy;

WHEREAS, in order to efficiently implement the procedures for the District to assume O&M responsibility for Private Laterals, District staff reviewed all other laterals (including ditches and canals) that service multiple landowners to ensure that the District would have a comprehensive approach to resolving questions as to ownership, operations, and maintenance now and into the future:

WHEREAS, the District has classified all canals, laterals, and ditches that service multiple landowners, into six categories based upon their particular traits and characteristics, and these six categories of laterals have been identified and designated as follows:

- District Laterals
- Lateral Maintenance Agreements
- Intermittent District Laterals (Checkerboard)
- Private Laterals used by the District for Pass-Through Conveyance
- Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners with History of O&M
- Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners

WHEREAS, at the May 3, 2018, June 7, 2018, June 21, 2018, and February 21, 2019, District Board of Directors meetings, District staff provided presentations regarding the six categories of laterals, and made recommendations regarding the procedures for implementing the O&M Policy as to each category; and

WHEREAS, the Board has fully considered staff's recommendations, and desires to proceed with the recommended categorization of lateral types and recommended procedures for implementing the O&M Policy as to each category.

WHEREAS, at the May 2, 2019, District Board of Directors meeting, the Board duly passed and adopted Resolution 2019-04.

WHEREAS, at the September 17, 2020, District Board of Directors meeting, the Board considered and approved the re-categorization of Lateral Hunter Creek-1b (HC-1b) from the category of *Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners with History of O&M* to the category of *a Private Lateral used by the District for Pass-Through Conveyance*.

WHEREAS, at the December 8, 2020, District Board of Directors meeting, the Board considered and approved an extension of landowner petition date by six months from December 31, 2020 to June 30, 2021.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the District as follows:

1. The canals, laterals, and ditches that service multiple landowners within the District shall be identified and categorized under the following six categories (including approximate lengths), and staff shall implement the O&M Policy as to each category as set forth below:
 - a. **District Laterals:** This category involves laterals in which GCID has undertaken historic O&M responsibility, and records delineate GCID responsibility for such laterals, as referenced in the Franklin Deed, Jacinto Irrigation District consolidation, Williams Irrigation District consolidation, etc. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 1 attached hereto.

For this category, no change in performance is required, and the District will continue its normal O&M practices.

- b. **Lateral Maintenance Agreements:** This category involves laterals in which lateral maintenance petitions were previously submitted by landowners and approved by the GCID Board of Directors in approximately the mid-1920s with an execution of a lateral maintenance agreement (LMA). Such LMAs included terms and conditions as follows: the District will clean and maintain the specified lateral with District forces and equipment; petitioning landowners shall keep the banks free from obstructions; landowners shall grant ingress/egress to the District along the lateral and its banks; cleaning and repairing shall not further burden the District; petitioning landowners indemnify the District for its operation and maintenance activities; at the District's discretion, rotation schedules can be provided for use of water, and the District may assume temporary charge of operation for all or part of the lateral; and the District is the sole judge of the character and extent of work to be performed. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 2 attached hereto.

For this category, staff will continue the O&M along these laterals provided the terms of the LMA is being honored by the landowners. The District will commence the process to secure new easements from landowners as time permits. The process to formalize the District's responsibility will come at no cost to landowners in those cases where landowners are fully complying with their obligations under the applicable LMA conditions.

Where the LMA is not being honored by the landowners, the District will require the landowners bring the lateral up to the standards of the LMA at their cost and will coordinate with the landowners on other infrastructure improvements and cost repayment alternatives.

- c. **Intermittent District Laterals (Checkerboard):** This category involves lateral systems with intermittent GCID rights-of-way and private landowner rights-of-way in which the District has an easement/right-of-way for a section, then no easement and the lateral is presumed private, and then another section with a District easement. Historically, GCID may have operated and conducted maintenance along the entire extent of the lateral. Since 2014, GCID has decreased its O&M activities to minimal maintenance and may continue to operate and control water conveyance on these systems. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 3 attached hereto.

For this category, staff will continue gathering signatures to petition the Board, attempt to secure easement agreements only, and require no payment from landowners to formalize the District's responsibility.

- d. **Private Laterals used by the District for Pass-Through Conveyance:** This category involves laterals in which GCID possesses no records or documentation for any O&M of the lateral system. GCID, however, has historically performed varying degrees of O&M for the system. GCID passes water through these laterals to supplement irrigation flow to other GCID laterals for the purpose of augmenting irrigation service to other lands. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 4 attached hereto.

For this category, staff will continue gathering signatures to petition the Board, attempt to secure easement agreements only, and require no payment from landowners to formalize the District's responsibility.

- e. **Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners with History of O&M:** This temporary category involves laterals in which GCID possesses no formal record of O&M responsibility but may have operated or performed some maintenance. Since 2014, the District has decreased its O&M activities to minimal maintenance and may continue to operate and control water conveyance on these laterals. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 5 attached hereto.

For this category, staff will continue gathering signatures to petition the Board, attempt to secure easement agreements only, and require no payment from landowners to formalize the District's responsibility.

The dissolution of this category shall occur by December 31, 2025, whereby laterals that have completed the process or are actively adhering to the process described above shall be re-categorized as District Laterals and the remaining laterals shall be re-categorized as Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners.

- f. **Private Laterals Serving Multiple Landowners:** This category involves laterals in which GCID possesses no record or documentation for any operation and maintenance (O&M) of the lateral system, GCID has conducted no O&M work on the laterals, irrigation orders are conveyed by GCID personnel at the lateral headgate, and the landowners retain all responsibility for O&M. The particular laterals that are classified within this category are listed in Exhibit 6 attached hereto.

For this category, staff will adhere to the O&M Policy process in place and allow landowners to elect to petition the GCID Board of Directors for District assumption of O&M responsibility. The District will not actively seek ownership, easements, or maintenance for these historically private systems. If a petition is submitted and approved by the District, then District staff will prepare infrastructure standardization cost estimates associated with each lateral and seek unanimous action by landowners to sign easement agreements and pay for infrastructure standardization. Upon final resolution by the Board, District staff will record easements and use the funds contributed by landowners and the District's funds to perform operations, maintenance, replacement, etc. on these facilities based on the normal O&M evaluations and practices of the District.

2. The foregoing categorization of laterals and respective procedures for implementing the District's O&M Policy shall be subject to change if additional information is provided to the Board that supports and warrants a change. In addition, a particular lateral (or portion thereof) that has been classified in accordance with the above categories may be reclassified to a different category where information is subsequently provided that supports reclassification. A formal petition is not required in order to process such a reclassification.
3. The District Board of Directors will, as necessary, individually consider further recommended actions to be taken for particular laterals, including but not limited to approval of landowner petitions, easement agreements, rights-of-way and grant deeds, the costs of facilities and improvements needed to bring the laterals up to district standards, related promissory notes, and lateral re-categorization.
4. As the implementation of this Resolution progresses, the District Board of Directors may elect to dissolve, consolidate, or develop new lateral categorization(s) in order to better identify and distinguish respective District and private O&M responsibilities for laterals that service multiple landowners.
